



Salena Godden FRSL is on award-winning author, poet and broadcaster of Jamaican-mixed heritage based in London. Her debut novel Mrs Death Misses Death won the Indie Book Award for Fiction and the People's Book Prize, and was shortlisted for the British Book Awards and the Gordon Burn Prize, Salena has been shortlisted for the 4thWrite short story prize and the Ted Hughes Prize. Her work has been widely anthologised and broadcast on radio, TV and film. Her poem, Pessimism is for Lightweights. is on permanent display at the People's History Museum, Manchester. She was inducted as a Fellow of the Royal Society of Literature in 2022.

Toria Garbutt is a poet and spoken word performer from Knottingley, West Yorkshire. Her work, rooted in themes of class, identity and personal experience, has been

featured on BBC platforms and widely across national stages. She has published two collections with Wrecking Ball Press – *The Universe and Me* and *Another Time in Space*. Toria works within the criminal justice system, using poetry as a tool for connection, reflection and rehabilitation. She was writer–in–residence at the Brontë Parsonage Museum in 2020.

Matt Abbott is a poet and award-winning lyricist from Wakefield. His critically-acclaimed spoken word stage show *Two Little Ducks* explored working-class support for Brexit alongside his experiences volunteering at a Calais refugee camp. The show's poems were published by VERVE in 2018. Matt's debut kids' poetry collection, *A Hurricane in My Head*, was published by Bloomsbury in 2019. Throughout his poetry career, he's shared a stage with

names including Paul Weller, Shaparak Khorsandi, Jeremy Corbyn MP, Sara Pascoe, and Sleaford Mods. He's also known for fronting indie band Skint & Demoralised

LIVEwire Poetry is a small poetryfocused organisation based in Leeds. Their live events aim to platform the most exciting poetry in the UK, and their writer development strand aims to champion underrepresented voices through poetry.

Drop in to speak to the friendly team, view the Telling Stories project and find out more about the Home Library Service which delivers books, large print and audio to house bound individuals across the borough.



An evening with Graeme Macrae Burnet in-conversation with Becki Pritchard

Graeme Macrae Burnet's propulsive, Bookershortlisted contemporary classic *His Bloody Project*, reissued to mark its tenth anniversary, is a mesmerisina literary thriller set in 1869 in a remote Highland community. His new novella, Benbecula, is a fictionalised account of a true crime that occurred in the Outer Hebrides just a few years prior. The events are reimagined through Burnet's lens with a focus on sanity, madness and violence, suffocating communities, and how iustice and punishment are meted out in unforgiving landscapes. Both are characterised by dark humour and Burnet's brilliant writing and highly original style of storytelling.

With his new book *The Door-to-Door Poet* (Eye Books) released in September 2O25, as well as a programme on BBC Radio 4 following swiftly after, Rowan McCabe returns to the stage with Hard Knocks, a show of comedy and spoken word about community and connection.

Rowan likes making a nuisance of himself with poetry. Over the past 10 years he's been poet in residence in a pizza takeaway, in William Wordsworth's childhood home and, once, on a miniature steam train. He's also the world's first Door-to-Door Poet and in 2019 he travelled across England, knocking on strangers' doors and writing bespoke verses for them, for free, on any subject of their choosing. It's a project that's been featured in the Guardian and on BBC Breakfast.

Hard Knocks is a collection of all new material that lifts the lid on some of the most funny and challenging moments of this unconventional career path. Expect stories of mistaken identity, odes to rebellious snails, and ruminations on time travelling public officials, all delivered with Rowan's trademark warmth and wit.
